**God has a Mission in the World;
God's Mission has a Church...**

We met and affirmed our belief that "PB&J" is the path that Christ the King should continue traveling. We shared a lot of energy and enthusiasm about what is along the path for us. We looked forward to the church growing a strong faith formation program for the younger kids. We are excited about the church beginning a program of prayer with the people next door at Brookdale. Enthusiasm abounds for the church offering various programs to students at Binghamton University. Interest was obvious for a new program that the church might serve the 20- and 30-somethings among us. Our meeting on March 18 was teeming with conversation and ideas for these and other programs that the church could, and should, do. But, who is "the church?" And, what are "programs?"

We may have all heard the statement, "God has a mission in the world, and God's mission has a church." Those words may somehow bring us some increase in our confidence in God's presence in the world. But, so what? Who is "church?" I'm sure you can see the obvious: the church is you; the church is me. But, once we get beyond those descriptors, it gets dangerous. Once we get to the point of identifying the church as something larger, something beyond its basic building blocks, we risk diminishing our own responsibility to it. When we begin to see "she", "he", "they", and "them" as church, we might begin to feel less of a need to step up and be the church ourselves. We might begin to say things like, "The church needs to..." and assign some need, or some part of God's mission, to be addressed to complete the statement. If everyone began to think that, it would be no different than making a peanut butter and jelly sandwich without the jelly...or the peanut butter.

It can be daunting to see yourself as a vital component of the church, thereby giving you an important role in God's mission in the world; some of us question if we can get out of bed each morning! How can little-old me serve in God's mission? What do I have to offer the world? First, you are not alone. Not only do you have God-given gifts and talents, you have the company of your friends at 499 Plaza Drive, and you also have the Christ-promised Holy Spirit with you.

Beginning April 8th, we will explore and (re)discover our God-given gifts, talents, strengths, and abilities with our Gift Discovery Workshop Series (details are elsewhere in this newsletter). Angie Crawford will guide us on this journey of self-discovery. While it is completely clear that we need tools to work a mission, it should be equally clear that we need to understand why we have a mission and understand how we use the tools. Just like no one wants me running around with an angle grinder looking for a project, we need to understand the use and purpose for our gifts in the mission(s) we are called to by God.

Our Faith Formation opportunities, small groups, and bible studies will help us further understand our place in the church, which is in place for God's mission. In fact, our participation in these are vital and necessary for that further understanding. We heard a lot of people talking about how we need to "grow" the congregation and grow particular programs. We have frequently expressed fears that we need to "grow or die." That sort of growth all looks outward: who is going to come and join us? How are we going to get them to come here? How are these new people going to provide us with resources to put the church on a firmer financial footing? We certainly need to grapple with those questions, but before we do that, we need to build ourselves (or grow ourselves); we need to build our own faith and our own faith community in a way that prepares an exciting, welcoming, and challenging environment for those who are interested in coming to the church. As we strengthen the bonds of our community and learn to speak a language that explains why that community is important for expressing God's love and sharing God's mission, we build a community that will grow. The fuller and richer the community, and the more the community reflects the fullness and richness of God's love, the more likely people will want to join that community.

As we grow in our relationship with God, our view of God's mission should begin to shift from crafting "programs" to creating relationships. All the ideas that we discuss as programs in God's Mission can easily be renamed, and re-framed as Relationships: faith formation relationships focused on the younger kids; prayer relationships with the people next door at Brookdale; relationships with students at Binghamton University; relationships with the 20- and 30-somethings among us. Programs are designed to be "at" or "to" someone, or something. God wants us all to build relationships with his world. With this simple change of words, God's church can create a major shift in the world for God's mission.

Just like the effects we see when a pebble is dropped in a pool of water, Christ the King Church can ripple God's grace, mercy, healing, peace, and joy throughout our valley. But it all starts with using God's word and God's message to gather those tiny grains of sand into a pebble big enough to send a ripple across the entire world. The formation of the pebble then its placement (by a force much greater than the pebble) in a particular pool, at a particular time to make the intended impact. The pool of water has changed. The pebble has changed. With God, both are better for it.

Capital Campaign

The capital campaign is coming to a close. The purpose of the Capital Campaign was to have money pledged that we could complete needed projects around the church and to increase our mission in our neighborhood and around the world. The congregation pledged approximately \$119,000.00 over three years. We have been able to complete the following projects:

- update our lights in order to reduce our carbon footprint and reduce our electric bill
- replace our gutters
- give to the Mission Investment Fund, and the American Church
- have windows installed in our classrooms for the safety of all
- have our furnace cleaned
- remove dead trees from our property
- put butterflies on the roof so the new gutters do not come down
- repair and paint the ceiling of the church, pastor's office and the narthex
- clean the carpets
- repair and seal coat the parking lot
- replace the original doors to the original church
- landscape the front and fix the bricks and handrails on the steps
- purchase new microphones, computer and projector
- repair the water issue in the back in addition to replacing the flooring that resulted from the flood

We still have some money in the bank to assist with the roof over the original church, the furnace (it is old), and for organ repairs. These are large ticket items. If you need to catch up with your pledge, please do so. Although the campaign is coming to an end, please consider your giving by allocating one-half to the capital fund and one half to "the church." In this way, we will be able to take care of our building and also continue our mission in our neighborhood and around the world. Thank you so much for your generosity.
