Has anyone ever really contemplated that question? The job of "pastor" is nowhere in the Bible. We've continued on as a thriving community of faith for lengthy periods of time without a pastor. Paul wrote his letters to various churches, but not one was addressed to the pastor of any of those churches. He described leadership in churches, but, never named a position of pastor. Do we need one because we've "always had one"? So, if we cave to the past and find a permanent called pastor, what will we expect s/he to do here at Christ the King?

Will we finally have someone who will preach, preside at communion, baptize, marry, and bury us? Will our new pastor coordinate rides to worship for folks in need? Will someone finally visit people in the hospital, nursing homes, or otherwise confined to home? Will our pastor roll out new adult education curricula to coincide with a younger version for the Yoots and Littles that s/he also designed? Will our Pastor assemble and lead small groups that we can slightly invest ourselves in as our schedules allow?

Will our pastor make connections in the community thereby identifying opportunities that we might consider thinking about contemplating the idea of entertaining the thought to serve those in need in our community? Will our pews finally begin to refill and our offering plates need to be resized from the arrival of all the new folks and young families that we seek to join us? Will s/he reduce the need for us to attend planning, worship, and ministry meetings and just make unilateral decisions for us to question? Will BU students flock to our walkway because of the connection our new pastor made with them? Will our new pastor find the best price for coffee to be served in our overflowing Café?

I'm sure I missed many expectations in the litany above. But, instead of reviewing the list for missing expectations, what if we shifted those expectations to ourselves? The hopes and dreams we each hold for our ministries that match the needs of the little valley we live in is a great place to begin looking for our role in God's Mission.

Where our passions and desires for humanity intersect with our God-given gifts and abilities might just be the sweet spot that the Holy Spirit is jumping up and down waving Her Holy arms trying to get our attention. If each one of us sought to find our place in God's mission, we would not only discover the depth and breadth of His mission (aka, His Love for everyone), but, we would also discover there is much that we as a community are called to be a part of right now. This broader view will help us better discern what we need in a Pastor.

I'm not saying that we don't need a pastor. I am suggesting, and encouraging, all of us to first, seek our place in God's mission. Then, second, identify additional resources we may need to work our appointed mission field. Then, third, as a true community should, look to each other for those resources. Then, finally, seek a Pastor for those communal needs of spiritual guidance and support.

"I am the true vine...Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me...apart from me you can do nothing. " John 15

This is the biblical witness as well. In both of the creation stories in the book of Genesis, human beings are created into a community of at least two: "male and female God created them. Community connections support our well being.

Our life is now nestled within his life which is one with the Divine Creator God. This is more than 'just' forgiveness of sins. Rather in our connection to Jesus we experience the ultimate healing of all the broken places in our life, a feat which is accomplished by joining us to the resurrected life of Jesus.

But wait, there is more! Along with our new life found in Christ (awesome by itself) we are now joined to the wider community of the baptized: connected to one and all. We are a body, working together for the well-being of the body. St Paul put that so well (and I paraphrase) 'the eye cannot say to the hand, just because you are not an eye, you are not a part of the body.' Our faith community needs all the parts in order to stay healthy, and to do the work of God.

.....and when we get tired, weak and worn, when the world begins to press in on every corner of life, when we get cranky and so very human with one another, Jesus comes to us again and again in the Word, the bread and the wine. There we remember who we are and whose we are. We receive again the power of the Holy Spirit poured out on all believers. We are fed and nourished to do our part of God's holy work. We become the body again.

Capital Campaign

Last month all of the projects that have been completed were listed in the capital campaign update. We now have up to date numbers. The pledges were approximately \$119,000. We have collected \$108,014 total as of April 8. We have spent \$37,667 on our projects. This leaves \$70,347 in our account for a new roof, water heater, and heating system when the time comes to replace them. Property team is having someone look at our roof to make a determination of how much time we have left on the old roof. Thank you everyone for your generosity during these past three years. As this campaign comes to an official end, we ask that you continue your generosity but possibly split between regular giving and capital campaign. All capital campaign money needs to be specifically marked in order to be put into the correct category.
