Annual Congregational Meeting

The 52nd Annual Congregational Meeting of Christ the King Lutheran Church will take place on Sunday, January 27, 2019.

> The meeting begins with worship at 10:00 AM and continues in the Fellowship Hall with a light brunch at 11:15 AM where we will celebrate the ministry accomplishments of 2018 and plan for God's mission in 2019.

As we gather in January to review the year past and plan for the year to come, I offer two important questions:

What do you hear God saying to you? How will you fold this into your life of faith?

Why these two questions?

First, because we often forget that God is speaking to us and guiding each one of us in our work in Jesus' name. Every single one of us! God speaks to each of us, calling us forward towards a life with Christ at its center.

God will use whatever is at hand to get our attention. It can be the words of a hymn, or a conversation with a friend. It can be is a Bible reading, the message on Sunday, a comment overheard, or an article you read somewhere. Often it is through prayer, where we approach God and then listen for God's leading.

No matter what the means, God is speaking to each of us all the time. We receive words of comfort and grace, words that prompt great thanksgiving, or that call us to confession and move us towards a more faithful life. We hear words that remind us to love in word and actions.

Every single one of these words is important – not just to you, but for the whole of our community here at Christ the King. We have been called together to be God's people in this place, and we need the discernment of each member of this body in order to discern where God is leading us.

Here is a good example from Luther Memorial. Over coffee, one woman remarked to those at her table. "Last week when it was so cold, I saw two elementary school students waiting for the bus with no hat or mittens. Can you imagine?" From there, research was done, plans were refined, partners in the community were recruited, and 114 used coats, in good shape, were collected throughout the community and shared through 3 agencies.

God is speaking to you...and wants to speak through you to our whole community. Listen for God's word and then share these thoughts with one another.

The second question presses us to action: How are you going to fold this into your life? God speaks in order to help us grow as servants/disciples/ believers. God's word asks us to pay attention. If you have received comfort, then who is in need of a word of comfort from you? If you have been moved to give thanks, then how will giving thanks shape your days? If you have heard God's call to care for our elders, then ask yourself, "Do you need to visit someone? Are there elders with no one caring for them?"

Imagine the conversations we will have when each of us is tuned into God's word to us! Those conversations might be messy, uncertain, and changing direction...but I can assure you that when God's word is at the center, they will be powerful and Spirit filled.

What is God saying to us? What are we to do with that word?

The answers to these questions are more critical than all the rest put together.

Thrivent Action Team Summaries

February 14, 2018

Ashes to Go – On Monday three of us went to the grocery store to purchase materials to make sandwiches, etc. On Tuesday, four people make up 150 brown bag lunches. On Ash Wednesday, deacons in their albs from Christ the King and Redeemer Lutheran provided Ashes to Go. This outreach mission takes place in the City of Binghamton in front of Redeemer. The deacons interacted with pedestrians as well as with the drivers of cars who pulled over to receive ashes. Also a bag lunch was distributed to 150 people along with prayer squares. The Action Team spent a total of 87 hours. Thrivent Financial provided \$250 dollars to purchase all materials. Team was made up of 12 volunteers.

March 24, 2018

Doug's Fish Fry for Youth Trip to Houston, Texas – On Saturday the youth had a bake and food sale and hosted Doug's Fish Fry. They received \$200 from Doug's which went to the youth trip. The Thrivent Funds went toward purchase of materials to make the bake goods and raffle items. The remaining funds from Thrivent went to the youth fund. A dozen volunteers assisted in the baking and 100 people came for the bake sale. The Action team spent a total 140 hours.

June 16, 2018

Soup Kitchen – On Saturday the 16th, Christ the King volunteers made and provided lunch at the soup kitchen. The meal was picnic style with hamburgers and hot dogs cooked on the grill and all the trimmings. This is a monthly Lunch Mission that the churches in the area share to serve those in need. On average they serve 60 plus meals each time. If any food is left, the remaining food and condiments are given to the evening group to serve along with their menu. The Action Team served a total of 98 volunteer hours. Thrivent Financial provided \$250 dollars to purchase all materials. Team was made up of 8 volunteers.

August 19, 2018

Sing Along – On Sunday the 19th, Jim Ford with his choir and musical instruments players performed a sing along as a means to purchase new choir music. Some of the new choir music that was purchased was sung by the choir and then the audience has an opportunity to sing along. The Action Team spent 35 total volunteer hours. Thrivent Financial provided \$250 dollars and purchased six new songs for the choir. A total of 96 pieces of sheet music was purchased for Jim Ford. Team was made up of 10 volunteers.

September 4, 2018

Back Packs for Kids – The week before the 4th Christ the King requested that the congregation bring to church pencils, rulers, binders, and any school supplies that a kid may need to start school. Thrivent Action Team gave \$250 dollars for the purchase of back packs. Back Packs were filled with school supplies by our congregation after our service on Sunday. The following Tuesday 40 Back Packs were distributed, 20 to Roosevelt Elementary and 20 Wilson Elementary. Both principals were delighted and know which students should be receiving this gift. The kids surprise and excitement made our volunteers very happy.

October 31, 2018

Gathering Potatoes – Due to the floods this year, the field of potatoes that the Southern Tier Tractor Club donates each year to the food banks was destroyed. We challenged the other Lutheran Churches to have members bring one bag of potatoes to church the week of October 29th. With the donation from Thrivent Financial and the help of three Lutheran churches we were able to supply the shelves of the Southern Tier Food Bank. With Thrivent Financials \$250 dollars and WEIS Market donation of \$25 dollars, we were able to purchase 920 pounds of potatoes. The three churches provided an additional 580 pounds making a total of 1500 pounds.

November 22, 2018

Thanksgiving Dinner – Members of Redeemer and Christ the King has hosted and cooked Thanksgiving dinner for those in need. There is no cost to those who attend. We have done this for many years and average feeding 100 people. Thrivent Financial \$250 dollars donation is used to purchase Turkey and Ham, stuffing, potatoes, and of course dessert for the dinner. We have a couple from Redeemer that volunteers each year to cook and Christ the King volunteers to assist all other duties. There were 13 volunteers and they spent 126 hours preparing and serving this meal.

December 15. 2018

Christmas Luncheon – Christ the King hosted a Christmas Luncheon at First Methodist Church in Endicott, NY. Volunteers from our church prepared, served and socialized during this meal. This was a Christmas meal for those who otherwise would not have one. Thrivent Financials \$250 dollars donation was used to purchase hams, turkey, potatoes, stuffing and the trimming, plus dessert. Sixty six people were served a good Christmas Luncheon and twelve children received a present from Santa (Teddy Bear). Nine volunteers spent 98 hours preparing and serving, and cleaning up the kitchen.

Total contributions: \$2000; over 600 hours. and over 70 volunteers. Thank you Thrivent and our volunteers!

This year's rallying cry for Finance has become, "Something's Gotta Change!". You can find the rows and columns of Christ the King's financial story elsewhere in this annual report. But, the stark Mathematics only provides a limited view of the work of the Holy Spirit and Her compelling us to a place of Radical Generosity. Many of us may be praying for the Holy Spirit to provide Christ the King the resources necessary to support our ministries that we believe are part of our role in God's mission in the world. What if we have these prayers reversed? What if we should be praying for more ministry opportunities, knowing full well that the Holy Spirit will provide, and always has provided, for those ministries to which God calls us in His mission? Our focus will shift from the numbers in the pews, to the hearts in our community.

Since 2015, our financial contributions to various local and global mission efforts has increased as a percent of the total offerings we receive (from 13% to 16%), but, the total dollars has declined from \$17,281 in 2015 to \$14,562 in 2018. The 2019 budget has hope that our mission dollars increase to \$16,500, or 18% of our offerings. That's the change. That's the call. Who will answer?
