DISCOVERING WORSHIP

Effective worship invites you in, allows you time to put aside (or offer up) the burdens you brought with you, to refocus on God's redeeming Word that is Jesus, and to, once again, be incorporated into the body of Christ. It is an encounter with God, yet only a glimpse at the mystery of God. It is intended to make us into one body again and prepare us to be about our discipleship when we leave. It is meant to be formative but never rote.

You may be surprised to know that the most important question to be answered when planning worship is Why? Why do we do the things we do? What will point us to God?

Lutheran liturgical worship has three parts: Gathering, Word and Meal. The Gathering portion (which can include confession, Kyrie, a hymn of praise) is intended to help us transition from our world to God's presence.

The Word is at the center (as Christ is at the center); it generates the theme for each week. We can have up to 4 readings (OT, Psalm, Epistle and Gospel). The sermon is a proclamation of God's Good News in Jesus.

The Meal is the culmination of encounter with God. With the living Lord present in the bread and wine, we are made into one body – the body of Christ. It renews our relationship with Jesus, strengthens us through the Spirit's power, and prepares us to carry God's Word of Grace into the world.

All of that can be done without any singing...or videos for that matter. However, people of faith have been singing since Moses crossed the Red Sea. The music has changed throughout the centuries, and it always arises out of the worshipping community. Different times and places generated different music styles and genres. It should come as no surprise that in the 21st century that has included a wide variety of musical instruments, and lots of visuals, primarily projected images and videos.

At first glance it may seem that the old and new cannot coexist. Yet we have always used strong visuals in our worship: the stained glass windows in the cathedrals were intended to teach the Bible stories; the changing colors of seasons is a teaching tool.

Organic Worship (11:15) grew out of a desire for a less formal worship experience that could incorporate more dialogue/conversation, more contemporary instruments and a strong use of visuals and videos. They also wanted to help folks understand the why behind the service.

Summer is upon us, and this year we will be incorporating some of the learning from the Organic Worship team with our Traditional forms.

We will begin worship with a video which succinctly and artistically presents the core Gospel message in 2 minutes. If you walk out of worship remembering nothing other than this video presentation, you will take the Good News of Jesus with you.

We will include some teaching moments during the service, short explanations of the 'why' behind what we are doing. We have chosen a Crowder song/video "Come as you are" for the communion hymn; it is easy to sing. We will use these newer elements for several weeks to help people learn.

You will also find us singing familiar hymns, using some liturgical pieces from the hymnal and retaining the basic form of traditional liturgical worship. All of this with an eye to the clock; our goal is no longer than one hour.

The worship teams will meet to evaluate our choices in mid-July. We will adjust anything that looked good on paper but doesn't work IRL. These summer weeks will help us explore our worship style and expand our repertoire.

May you enter this summer's worship expecting nothing more than to encounter the Holy One of God. May you find yourself enriched by a different worship experience.
