Are you ready for college?

Yet, it is a critical time of transition and transformation for these young people, just as such experiences were for we older folk. Some of us went into military service (that must have been a shock!) Some began their first real job with its expectations of 40+ hour weeks, little time off and a too small paycheck.

I mention all this because when you are face to face with major change, everyone panics a little. Some panic a lot. Everyone has to endure degrees of discomfort. New skills will be required – even if it is something as easy as learning the metro card system for buses. Old habits will have to be adjusted; new responsibilities will have to be assumed; even new vocabulary learned so to navigate the new system. There will be a learning curve and longing for the old ways.

At the same time, there will also be new relationships. You will discover new strengths and passions. You will find better ways of thinking or doing. You will become a new version of yourself.....as long as you don't lose your nerve. As long as you don't give up too soon.

If you are clear about **why** (you are doing what you are doing) and clear about **who** (you are, you want to be); if you are clear about **your core values** and willing to **seek wisdom** from the experienced ones, then the adjustments and discomforts become badges of merit for obstacles overcome.

Sisters and brothers in Christ, you are beloved children of a God of love – healing, forgiving, guiding, nourishing love. That is who you are; that is who you will forever be.

You have heard the Good News of Jesus and it has changed your life; it has shaped your days and your choices. It continues to challenge you to live into that love.

You have been given abundant resources, a wide range of talents, and the power of the Holy Spirit to invite others into fellowship.

You have been called into a future which God is preparing – a future of Great Shalom – which will break out within and among you here and now.

Grace and peace to you all. What a joy it has been to work with you and to see the depth of your faith. The Spirit is moving powerfully among you; trust the Spirit.

What L. Gail Irwin's book, *Toward the Better Country* has to say applies to our personal relationship with faith and God. But as pastors and church leaders, it speaks to the current crux of where we are as church:

The history of God's covenant with us has carried us through periods of both settlement and wilderness wandering. And that story has not ended. We keep building stone foundations; and God keeps beckoning us back into the wilderness to hear the pure word of truth, to be fed by ravens and angels and to rediscover who and whose we are. The decline we are seeing now in the life of institutional churches is part of the greater story of how God keeps nudging us out of our comfort zones and on to that better country. It is our task to keep moving forward with trust, even when we're not sure where we're headed.
